A Message from Bishop Danny

Dear Parishioners.

Mid-way through Lent, the readings this Sunday focus on our need to repent.

St Paul writes strongly to the Corinthians when he reminds them that the Jewish people all received many graces as they followed Moses through the desert -Yet, "most of them failed to please God and their corpses littered the desert."

In the Gospel, Jesus speaks of two disasters which had cost many lives. Those killed. Jesus said, were not any more quilty than others, yet "unless you repent, you will all perish as they did." He also taught of the patience of God through the parable of the farmer who gave his fig tree one more year to produce fruit; then, if it continued to disappoint, it could be cut down.

Throughout the different periods of the Church, the great theologians and saints have been sometimes more, and sometimes less, optimistic about how many Christians would make it to Heaven. Some saints believed that only very few would be saved. Jesus Himself said that it is a narrow road that leads to Eternal Life and few take it. Our age tends to be more optimistic.

We will not know how many occupy Heaven. However, we do know that we need to repent. We need to purify our hearts: to love God with all our hearts, minds and beings - and to put everything else in its proper order. We are to deny our selfishness and be filled with the love, goodness and generosity of God. We are people of hope and light. This is all so worthwhile, you have to wonder why we are so slow to repent!

The Farm - Galong

A wonderful work is carried on by a lady called Kate Cleary, and helpers, at Galong, using a former Mercy Convent. Because many in our society have lost their understanding of the sacredness of Marriage, Family and Life and have become utterly tolerant of any kind of behaviour we call sinful – there are many, particularly the most vulnerable, who suffer greatly. I saw this suffering on the streets of inner city Sydney. Kate tries to assist women who come from backgrounds of prostitution, drug and alcohol addiction, domestic violence, sexual abuse and family breakdown. Obviously, those she assists suffer from various mental and physical illnesses. She works with a Catholic understanding that we are spiritual as well as physical and intellectual and so her program is holistic, trying to attend to all the needs of those involved.

Kate has asked for assistance. If anyone is aware of a young woman who has a heart for God's poor and wounded and could offer her time (maybe a gap year) and has the virtues of patience, love and hope, please let me or Fr Richard know.

And if anyone is aware of anyone who might benefit from time at the Farm for some holistic rehabilitation, please let me know. And, please also keep it in mind for future reference.

First Reading

Ex 3:1-8. 13-15

A reading from the book of Exodus

This is what you must say to the children
of Israel: I Am has sent me to you.

Moses was looking after the flock of Jethro, his father-in-law, priest of Midian. He led his flock to the far side of the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God, There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in the shape of a flame of fire, coming from the middle of a bush. Moses looked; there was the bush blazing but it was not being burnt up. 'I must go and look at this strange sight,' Moses said, 'and see why the bush is not burnt.' Now the Lord saw him go forward to look, and God called to him from the middle of the bush. 'Moses, Moses!' he said. 'Here I am' he answered. 'Come no nearer' he said. 'Take off your shoes, for the place on which you stand is holy ground. I am the God of your father,' he said 'the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob.' At this Moses covered his face, afraid to look at God. And the Lord said, 'I have seen the miserable state of my people in Egypt. I have heard their appeal to be free of their slave-drivers. Yes, I am well aware of their sufferings. I mean to deliver them out of the hands of the Egyptians and bring them up out of that land to a land rich and broad, a land where milk and honey flow.' Then Moses said to God, 'I am to go, then, to the sons of Israel and say to them, "The God of your fathers has sent me to you." But if they ask me what his name is, what am I to tell them?' And God said to Moses, 'I Am who I Am. This' he added 'is what you must say to the sons of Israel: "The Lord, the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you." This is my name for all time; by this name I shall be invoked for all generations to come.'

Second Reading

1 Cor 10:1-6, 10-12

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

All this that happened to the people of Moses in the desert was written for our benefit.

I want to remind you how our fathers were all guided by a cloud above them and how they all passed through the sea. They were all baptised into Moses in this cloud and in this sea; all ate the same spiritual food and all drank the same spiritual drink, since they all drank from the spiritual rock that followed them as they went, and that rock was Christ. In spite of this, most of them failed to please God and their corpses littered the desert. These things all happened as warnings for us, not to have the wicked lusts for forbidden things that they had. You must never complain: some of them did, and they were killed by the Destroyer. All this happened to them as a warning and it was written down to be a lesson for us who are living at the end of the age. The man who thinks he is safe must be careful that he does not fall.

Lk 13:1-9

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Unless you repent you will all perish as they did.

Some people arrived and told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with that of their sacrifices. At this he said to them, 'Do you suppose these Galileans who suffered like that were greater sinners than any other Galileans? They were not, I tell you. No; but unless you repent you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen on whom the tower at Siloam fell and killed them? Do you suppose that they were more guilty than all the other people living in Jerusalem? They were not, I tell you. No; but unless you repent you will all perish as they did.'

He told this parable: 'A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard, and he came looking for fruit on it but found none. He said to the man who looked after the vineyard, "Look here, for three years now I have been coming to look for fruit on this fig tree and finding none. Cut it down: why should it be taking up the ground?" "Sir," the man replied "leave it one more year and give me time to dig round it and manure it: it may bear fruit next year; if not, then you can cut it down."

Reflection by Michael Tate

There was a terrible disaster when a building fell down killing eighteen people. Some said, 'Oh, those killed must have been sinners, they or their parents.' Jesus repudiates that notion: 'No, it wasn't for anything they did.' It was clear to Jesus that they were the victims of poor construction and conditions at Siloam. Look at the builder. Responsibility needs to be brought home to those who would otherwise hide behind a religious ideology, or the sheer self-interest of evading blame for a situation. To identify those really responsible may well require major changes to the way society is organised. Does it all seem too difficult? Jesus helps us with a metaphor: You are like a fig tree which may not be bearing much fruit just now, but I am a terrific gardener:I will water you, dig around you, make sure you are well nourished so that you will bear the fruits I desire. Our Lord does that by: watering us with the waters of baptism; pruning us, especially during Lent; nourishing us with the bread of life in Holy Communion. We might pause at various times during Lent to allow Our Lord to garden us so that he may create a heavenly botanical garden, a new Eden, of the whole of humanity.




Growing fruit
