A Message from Fr Richard

Dear Parishioners,

Welcome to the Holy week! We begin this week with the reading of the whole Passion story. The Passion narrative is a story of suffering. What lessons does Jesus teach us in his suffering? The story shows how Jesus responded to what was done to him. He absorbed all the violence, transformed it, and returned it as love and forgiveness. It is an invitation to look to the example of Jesus.

We'll pick up this story again and again - It's a sobering realization, but don't despair. This is not the end of the story.

- On Wednesday, we shall remember his betrayal. Jesus saying, "I already know what you are planning to do; I know your problems, your evil intentions, your secret sins. Yet, still I am here with you... It is not too late."
- On Thursday night we'll pick up the story again and follow what happens to Jesus and to his people just like us. We'll hear of him kneeling at the feet of people just like us and washing our feet and promising us that we'll be a part of him. Thursday is also a celebration of the gift of the Eucharist and the priesthood - a reflection on the example of humble service Jesus gives to us.
- And on Friday we'll look in horror at the extent of what people just like us can do and we'll hear him say for us, "Father, forgive them, they don't know what they're doing." Friday is "Good" because we truly remember how much Jesus loved us - even with his death on the cross.
- Saturday we are without a liturgy and are awaiting the night-time celebration of the Resurrection, which is his and is now ours.
- And by Sunday, who knows what we might become!!

New parish priest

Fr Sebastian Savarimuthu will take over as parish priest of All Hallows on 21 June. Fr Sebastian has been parish priest of Mary Immaculate Parish, Bossley Park, for the last 12 years. Prior to that, he ministered in All Saints, Liverpool and the Cathedral.

Fr Sebastian studied and worked as a priest in Rome. So, he speaks Italian fluently. In fact, he worked for Pope Benedict. However, his desire was for parish work, not administrative work, and ended up coming to Australia after some bad health.

I will be moving to St Peter's, Surry Hills, with accommodation in the presbytery. I will be able to keep in touch with some of the marginalized and homeless people I met last year, and will be vicar for this part of the Archdiocese of Sydney.



First Reading

Is 50:4-7

A reading from the prophet Isaiah I did not cover my face against insult and I know I will not be ashamed.

The Lord has given me a disciple's tongue. So that I may know how to reply to the wearied he provides me with speech. Each morning he wakes me to hear, to listen like a disciple. The Lord has opened my ear. For my part, I made no resistance, neither did I turn away. I offered my back to those who struck me, my cheeks to those who tore at my beard; I did not cover my face against insult and spittle. The Lord comes to my help, so that I am untouched by the insults. So, too, I set my face like flint; I know I shall not be shamed.

But God raised him high and gave him the name which is above all other names so that all beings in the heavens, on earth and in the underworld, should bend the knee at the name of Jesus and that every tongue should acclaim Jesus Christ as Lord, to the glory of God the Father.


Lowly Prince of Peace

Jesus entered Jerusalem, not as a warrior in the tradition of King David as many had hoped for, but riding simply on a donkey. The disciples and the crowd applauded him, but they proved fickle in their support.

On the other hand, Jesus remained steadfast in his commitment to non-violent revolutionary change of the religious and political systems so as to establish the reign of God. Why did he renounce marshaling human and angelic warriors to further his cause?

First, Jesus embodied God-for-us, and God does not want the destruction of those he has created out of love. Second, Jesus had a premonition that an armed revolt would lead to the destruction of Jerusalem and the dispersal of the Jewish people (as occurred in 70AD).

Third, Luke's Gospel recounts that as Jesus laboured up Mount Calvary he turned to some wailing women and said, 'Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, weep rather for yourselves and for your children.' He knew that they suffer grievously in armed uprising



We could take a moment to pray that the Church of the 21st century, successor of the pacifist Church of the first three centuries, may enter on a new period of reflection on these issues, grappling with the desire to protect the innocent, yet always challenged by the man on a donkey, Divine Prince of Peace.
