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A Message from Bishop Danny

Dear Parishioners.

The first thing in the morning on the first day of the week, after the Sabbath was over, the women went to the tomb to put the spices and ointments on Jesus' dead body, as was the custom. However, they found the stone rolled away and the tomb empty.

Confusion reigned for a few hours. Was his body stolen? The women said Angels had appeared to them speaking of Jesus' resurrection. Peter and John had been to the tomb and, also, found it empty. Mary Magdalene claimed to have seen the Lord Risen. And, indeed, that evening, Jesus did appear in the Upper Room and assured them of his Resurrection.

He had not just been resuscitated like before, like Lazarus, who would get sick and die again. No Jesus appeared in a new way – he was now in the Eternal Glory of the Father and His Body had taken on a newness, thought they could still touch him and recognize him. His glory is the glory to which we are all called - a new life which we can glimpse at now, but which remains hidden. For faithful followers of Jesus, though, Jesus' glory will be our glory also.

This is the terrific joy of Easter and the Good News of Christianity. The brutality and sin of the Cross was overcome in the Resurrection. It is all God's work. God's new life is for us too, and is for all people if they would listen. Sin and death – awful as they truly are - will always be overcome. God is with us now and is drawing us forward to a future wonderful beyond words. So, rejoice. The Lord is Risen and leads us forward.

Divine Mercy Sunday - 24 April

In accordance with Our Lord's request to St Faustina, and as announced by Pope John Paul II for universal Church, the Second Sunday of Easter (first Sunday after Easter) is Divine Mercy Sunday.



The message of The Divine Mercy is simple. It is that God loves us – all of us,

and He wants us to recognize that His mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon Him with trust, receive His mercy, and let it flow through us to others.

A plenary indulgence is attached to this Sunday.

The conditions for the plenary indulgence are Sacramental Confession, Eucharistic communion and prayer for the intentions of the Pope; and to have a spirit that is completely detached from the affection for a sin, even a venial sin, take part in the prayers and devotions held in honour of Divine Mercy or, in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament exposed or reserved in the tabernacle, recite the Our Father, and the Creed, adding a devout prayer to the merciful Lord Jesus (e.g. Merciful Jesus, I trust in You)

First Reading

Acts 10:34, 37-43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles We have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead.

Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: 'You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him. Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself: and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses - we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead - and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name.'

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Colossians

Look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is.

Since you have been brought back to true life with Christ, you must look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is, sitting at God's right hand. Let your thoughts be on heavenly things, not on the things that are on the earth, because you have died, and now the life you have is hidden with Christ in God. But when Christ is revealed – and he is your life – you too will be revealed in all your glory with him.

Gospel

Jn 20:1-9

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

The teaching of scripture is that he must rise from the dead.

It was very early on the first day of the week and still dark, when Mary of Magdala came to the tomb. She saw that the stone had been moved away from the tomb and came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved. 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb' she said 'and we don't know where they have put him.'



So Peter set out with the other disciple to go to the tomb. They ran together, but the other disciple, running faster than Peter, reached the tomb first; he bent down and saw the linen cloths lying on the ground, but did not go in. Simon Peter who was following now came up, went right into the tomb, saw the linen cloths on the ground, and also the cloth that had been over his head; this was not with the linen cloths but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple who had reached the tomb first also went in; he saw and he believed. Till this moment they had failed to understand the teaching of scripture, that he must rise from the dead.

Reflection by Dianne Bergant

Easter is the season of mystagogical catechesis, that instruction that unpacks the hidden mystery of the experience of the sacraments of initiation received or renewed at Easter. The readings of each Sunday concentrate on some aspect of this mystery. The central theme of this Sunday is newness of life in Christ. This newness is not without its historical context. It burst forth first in the resurrection of Christ, and then through the preaching of the first Christians.

The readings testify that if we die with Christ, we will appear with him in glory; if we cast out the old yeast, we will be fresh dough. And when this wondrous transformation takes place, everything is new; everything is fresh. To what newness are we called? To what must we die in order to rise transformed? What old yeast of corruption must be cast out in order that we might be fresh dough? At Easter we renew our baptismal vows. What is it that we really renounce? Ours is a world of violence, of prejudice, of indifference. Too often we harbour feelings of anger and resentment, of selfishness and disdain. Easter proclaims that Christ has died and has risen; with him we die to all of the wickedness in our lives and in our world, and we set our hearts on higher things, on sincerity and on truth.
