A Message from Bishop Danny

Dear Parishioners,

In the early books of the Old Testament, there is reference to a chieftain, Amalek, who would wreak 100 fold vengeance on someone who wronged him. So, the Jewish law – No, just an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth, must be seen as an advance. Jesus, of course, would take the revelation of God's ways, into which we are invited, much further. As you know, Jesus taught us to love our enemies. Pray for those who persecute us. Bless those who curse yus. Be compassionate as your Heavenly Father is compassionate. And, in today's Gospel, he gives the final formulation on the law of love: Love one another as I have loved you. And the next day, Good Friday, he would show the extraordinary depths of God's love as he died on the Cross for us.

As the revelation of God's law developed, so must we. We must grow from our selfish, individualistic tendencies, much like Amalek, into deeper and deeper love. We are called to love and keep loving. Becoming more generous, kinder, more forgiving and trusting. More and more, we are called to live the life of God. Because we are created in God's image and our home is in Heaven as we read in the second Reading.

So, let's keep moving on our journey. More generous. More hopeful and trusting. More loving and forgiving. Tender of heart. And let our spirit reach out to more and more people so that they see something really good here at All Hallows. They see the Spirit of God.

First Reconciliation

Our First Reconciliation classes commence this week, classes beginning at 7pm on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Please be on time, bring your quizzes and workbooks with you. I pray that the program is enjoyable and instructive for us all.

Childcare Center

This weekend plans for the proposed childcare center will be on display in the foyer of the Church. There will also be representatives of Sydney Catholic Early Childhood Services, who will be building and operating the childcare, to answer any questions and sheets on which you might like to write any comments you might have.

The Pastoral Council and Finance Committee met last December and decided to proceed with the childcare. We hope that it will enlarge the evangelizing reach of the parish, assist families with children at All Hallows, and be financially beneficial to the parish. In designing the center, we asked the architect to:

- Ensure that the parish have one room, able to accommodate 30 people with toilet, storage and kitchenette, available to us at all time;
- The quiet enjoyment of residents in the Msgr Peoples retirement village be respected;
- Have good facilities the parish can use when the childcare is closed i.e. in the evenings and weekends.

We'll see what comments people have and make changes to the plans as we are able. If all goes reasonably well with the feedback, the next steps will be to seek approval from the Archdiocese and then to lodge documents with Council.



First Reading

Acts 14:21-27

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles. They assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them.

Paul and Barnabas went back through Lystra and Iconium to Antioch. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith. 'We all have to experience many hardships' they said 'before we enter the kingdom of God.' In each of these churches they appointed elders, and with prayer and fasting they commended them to the Lord in whom they had come to believe.

They passed through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. Then after proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia and from there sailed for Antioch, where they had originally been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now completed. On their arrival they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith to the

Reflection by Dianne Bergant

Everything is new! There is a new law of love, a new heaven and earth that is established in the church, a new depth of communion there, and a new glory of God that shines forth from its members.

The new commandment that Jesus announces is more than tolerance or mutual respect. It requires self-sacrificing love. Perhaps the greatest obstacle to this love is the diversity discussed last Sunday. It is hard enough to love those who are like us; how can we possibly love those who are different? And how can we love those who do not love us? It is no wonder that the commandment is called new. It calls for something completely different.

The new commandment is the law of the new heaven and the new earth that are established in the new Jerusalem. Standards are entirely different there. The greater ones serve; the meek possess the earth; happy are the poor; woe to those who laugh. This is clearly a city that comes down from heaven, not one made by human hands. It is a city that embraces all who come to it. God dwells in the midst of this city, in the heart of this people. God dwells with them and they dwell with God.

Through this new love, this new heaven and new earth, this new depth of communion, the glory of God is manifested in a new way. The eschatological future is anticipated in the present. The age of fulfilment has dawned.
