Dear Parishioners,

A Reflection by Fr Richard

There was a domestic argument. Father and mother exchanged heated loud words. The children were dumbfounded. Then suddenly the 12-year-old girl ran upstairs, took out her mobile phone and rang her parents' number. The father took the call and was astounded to hear a feminine voice say, "Good evening, sir. I'm a reporter and am doing a survey for one of the magazines. Do you love your wife?"

The father is taken completely off guard, stuttered, and stammered, "Yes. Of course...naturally." Then he called out to his wife, "Jenny, come here a minute." The girl again asked, "Excuse me, but I'm gathering statistics for a study. Could you tell me, do you love your husband?" As she answered "Yes", she recognized her own daughter's voice... "Thank you," said the voice at the other end... After that the father took out his handkerchief and wiped the sweat off his forehead, sank into a chair and said, "Jenny, what we need is a cup of coffee."

The thought of family turmoil based on hatred must have shocked those who heard Jesus or read Luke. When parents stood against their children or children defied their elders, family loyalty ceased to exist. Families disintegrated into shameful bickering at best, and feuds, at worst. Such division weakened neighbourhoods, communities, even regions. If the family were important enough, such division could threaten a nation and divide a people.

Faith can divide families, just as Jesus stated. But the opposite is also true. Faith can unify families. Faith can even make the family a sign of the Kingdom. As the marriage of a couple in the Church, the sacrament of Matrimony is more than a legal contract that forms a marital union. The sacrament of matrimony forms a lifelong relationship between God and the couple. The marriage partners represent Christ to each other and love each other with the same type of self-giving love that Christ has for his Church. The fruit of that love and union is children, who are to be brought up as Christians by their parents (See the Catechism of the Catholic Church: 1660, 1661).

All of us have been affected by the pain of divided families directly or indirectly. Divorce is one cause. A rift between generations or siblings is another. As a Christian, how can you help heal the division of a family (even a little) this week?

Jer 38:4-6. 8-10 A reading from the prophet Jeremiah You bore me to be a man of strife for the whole world. The king's leading men spoke to the king. 'Let Jeremiah be put to death: he is unquestionably disheartening the remaining soldiers in the city, and all the people too, by talking like this. The fellow does not have the welfare of this people at heart so much as its ruin.' 'He is in your hands as you know,' King Zedekiah answered 'for the king is powerless against you.' So they took Jeremiah and threw him into the well of Prince Malchiah in the Court of the Guard, letting him down with ropes. There was no water in the well, only mud, and into the mud Jeremiah sank. He put a new song into my mouth, praise of our God. Many shall see and fear and shall trust in the Lord. (R.) 4. As for me, wretched and poor, the Lord thinks of me. You are my rescuer, my help, O God, do not delay! (R.)	Heb 12:1-4 A reading from the letter to the Hebrews Let us bear patiently the struggle placed upon us. With so many witnesses in a great cloud on every side of us, we too, then, should throw off everything that hinders us, especially the sin that clings so easily, and keep running steadily in the race we have started. Let us not lose sight of Jesus, who leads us in our faith and brings it to perfection: for the sake of the joy which was still in the future, he endured the cross, disregarding the shamefulness of it, and from now on has taken his place at the right of God's throne. Think of the way he stood such opposition from sinners and then you will not give up for want of courage. In the fight against sin, you have not yet had to keep fighting to the point of death.

For from now on a household of five will be divided: three against two and two against three; the father divided against the son, son against father, mother against daughter, daughter against mother, mother-in-law against daughter-in-law, daughter-in-law against mother-in-law.'


