# A Reflection by Fr Richard

A young boy called a local parish church to ask the priest to come by to pray for his mother who had been very ill with the flu. The priest knew the family and was aware they had been attending another church down the road. So the priest asked, "Shouldn't you be asking Fr. Simon down the road to come by to pray with your mom?" The young boy replied, "Yeah, but we didn't want to take the chance that he might catch whatever this is that Mom has."

Leprosy was a very contagious disease. Lepers were strictly forbidden to get near healthy people. They called out when approaching so that no one would get close enough to be contaminated with the disease. Besides, the Law of the Pentateuch required lepers to live "outside the camp" - not to enter the Temple precincts. It was alleged that their disease was a judgment of God against them and only God could heal them. So, lepers were not healed by human agency, but they had to be cleansed, just as Naaman the Aramean had been cleansed by bathing in the Jordan River.

The gospel tells a healing story of ten lepers along the border between Samaria and Galilee. Due to some historical factors, Jews and Samaritans were often hostile to each other. Nonetheless, a group of Jews and Samaritans were drawn together by their common suffering of leprosy. When they cried for pity, Jesus told them to go and show themselves to the priests. Along the way, they were healed but only one came back to give thanks. The thankful man was a Samaritan.

Saying "thank-you" was and is much more than being polite. It is acknowledging where and whom the gift has come from. In other words, the Samaritan returned to worship the God who had healed him. Jesus then asks, "Were not all ten made clean? The other nine, where are they?" Among the many people asking God for healing and favours, how many will really come to love God? Shall we take God's gifts and run?

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

It seems that no one has returned to give thanks to God except this foreigner.

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus travelled along the border between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered one of the villages, ten lepers came to meet him. They stood some way off and called to him. 'Jesus! Master! Take pity on us.' When he saw them he said, 'Go and show yourselves to the priests.' Now as they were going away they were cleansed. Finding himself cured, one of them turned back praising God at the top of his voice and threw himself at the feet of Jesus and thanked him. The man was a Samaritan. This made Jesus say, 'Were not all ten made clean? The other nine, where are they? It seems that no one has come back to give praise to God, except this foreigner.' And he said to the man, 'Stand up and go on your way. Your faith has saved you.'



# Gospel Focus – Where are they?



The other nine, where are they?' asked Jesus. Why would the other nine not have come back to give thanks? It is insufficient to say that the miraculous healing these men experienced changed their lives. Being healed of this disease meant so much to them: they could return to their families; they could return to work; they could touch another person; they could walk among other people; they could join in prayer at the synagogue. As they hurried

back toward town they must have been overwhelmed by the possibilities and opportunities that lay before them. But they neglected to acknowledge the source of their great joy!
