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A Reflection by Fr Richard

Today, Jesus uses the images of salt and light to describe the identity, the vocation, and the mission of the church:

"You are the salt of the earth." This is not a command or a suggestion from Jesus, it is a statement of fact. "You are the salt of the earth." That's who we are. Salt is a sign of permanence and purity. In the Old Testament, salt is seen as a sign of "a perpetual covenant", since it is also used as a preservative. (See 2 Chronicles 13:5, 8; Leviticus 2:13; Ezekiel 43:24).

Being the salt of the earth means that the church and every Christian, has an obligation of bringing out the taste of God in the world. If we fail to have the effect that salt is supposed to have (Taste, permanence and purity), that's it, there's no back-up plan.

Similarly, Jesus says, "You are the light of the world." Again, we're it. If the light is under a bucket, we're a wasted light, we're just burning up fuel for no benefit, but we're still the only light. We are the light of the world. Israel was given the mission of being a light to the nations, that God's salvation would reach to the ends of the earth (see Isaiah 42:6; 49:6).

We are the salt of the earth. We are the light of the world. The purpose of our life together is to bring out the flavour, the colour, the zest of life, that is, the godliness of creation.

Pope's Prayer Intention - February

For Parishes.

We pray that parishes, placing communion at the center, may increasingly become communities of faith, fraternity and welcome towards those most in need.

First Reading

Is 58:7-10

A reading from the prophet Isaiah **Your light will shine like the dawn.**

Thus says the Lord: Share your bread with the hungry, and shelter the homeless poor, clothe the man you see to be naked and turn not from your own kin. Then will your light shine like the dawn and your wound be quickly healed over. Your integrity will go before you and the glory of the Lord behind you. Crv. and the Lord will answer: call, and he will say, 'I am here.' If you do away with the yoke, the clenched fist, the wicked word, if you give your bread to the hungry, and relief to the oppressed, your light will rise in the darkness, and your shadows become like noon.



Responsorial Psalm

(R.) A light rises in the darkness for the upright.

- 1. He is a light in the darkness for the upright: he is generous, merciful and just. The good man takes pity and lends, he conducts his affairs with honour. (R.)
- 2. The just man will never waver: he will be remembered forever. He has no fear of evil news; with a firm heart he trusts in the Lord. (R.)
- 3. With a steadfast heart he will not fear; open-handed, he gives to the poor; his justice stands firm forever. His head will be raised in glory. (R.)



Second Reading

1 Cor 2:1-5

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

I came to you to proclaim Christ crucified.

When I came to you, brothers, it was not with any show of oratory or philosophy, but simply to tell you what God had guaranteed. During my stay with you, the only knowledge I claimed to have was about Jesus, and only about him as the crucified Christ. Far from relying on any power of my own, I came among you in great 'fear and trembling' and in my speeches and the sermons that I gave, there were none of the arguments that belong to philosophy; only a demonstration of the power of the Spirit. And I did this so that your faith should not depend on human philosophy but on the power of God.

Gospel

Mt 5:13-16

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew **You are the light of the world.**

Jesus said to his disciples: 'You are the salt of the earth. But if salt becomes tasteless, what can make it salty again? It is good for nothing, and can only be thrown out to be trampled underfoot by men. 'You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill-top cannot be hidden. No one lights a lamp to put it under a tub; they put it on the lamp-stand where it shines for everyone in the house. In the same way your light must shine in the sight of men, so that, seeing your good works, they may give the praise to your Father in heaven.'



Scriptural context – Following blessings



Gandhi, the great leader of the Indian independence movement, is credited with saying, 'You must be the change you want to see in the world.' He sought a life free from tyranny and violence and so led a movement of non-violent resistance. It's tempting to think that he may have been influenced by some of the teachings of Jesus because so much of his approach reflected Jesus' call for justice. The charge to be the light of the world that shines in the sight of all and sets an example for all is echoed succinctly in Gandhi's words.

Have you thought? - Affirmation or Challenge

The salt and light of the world passage is often used to affirm and encourage, but when Jesus tells his disciples – and us – to be salt and light of the world it is not so that they can draw attention and glory to themselves. The whole purpose of being salt and light is to lead others into right relationships with one another and with God. Whilst the translation we have clearly states that disciples are to be salt and light of the world, it is just as clear that the intention is that they/we be salt and light *for* the world.
